She was an examiner, lecturer, and adjudicator as well as teaching both children and professionals. To reach their full potential students were given specialist training in Ballet, Modern, Tap, Jazz, Gymnastics and Drama at her dance academy.

She co-ordinated the Miss Dance of Great Britain held at the City Hall, Sheffield for many years, now held at the Winter Gardens, Blackpool. A bursary in her memory is now awarded annually and pesented by her family.

A true professional in all aspects , Miss Wicks inspired hundreds of students progressing their talent and excellence in their careers. Many continued to perform professionally throughout the world.

Rosalyn organised and choreographed hundreds of productions. All showcasing the discipline of dance and stimulating their love of theatrical excellence. Throughout the years she raised funds for several charities. Many were held at the Civic Hall in Barnsley, amongst many other venues.

Barnsley born and bred a true friend and colleague, a very special lady.

Congress 2019 additional report Monday 6 July 2019 Ballroom morning lectures.

We were greeted in Southport by a busy and bustling town and beautiful sunshine. As the doors to the floral hall opened at 9.00am there was a slow and steady arrival of members and students all keen to find their favourite seats and get ready for a busy day ahead. Anna Jones formally opened the 2019 congress and hoped everyone would find lots of useful information to take home and enjoy meeting each other and making new IDTA friends.

9.30am - Latin Development for Medallist to Competitor. Damian Evans from Dance Options in Cheam, gave us ideas to help pupils develop from a non competitive social dancer to a competitor. He felt it important to start everyone on their road to dancing in a fun and socially interactive way and then pin point people that have the passion to take their dancing further. Starting by using the Medal Test system and then progressing through more technique to develop each person within their own capability. With the help of demonstrators Alfie and Olivia he used simple variations in both Cha Cha and Rumba and showed how they could then be developed into routines for the competitive dance floor.

10.15 am - Freestyle. Samantha Williams took on the job of showing everyone a useful routine that could be adapted for use at a variety of levels. She was assisted by her young demonstrator Ellie and joined on the floor by a few brave delegates who successfully proved how useful the routine could be. Samantha used interesting choreography, with jumps leaps and spins, all of which she showed alternatives for if you were using the routine at a more basic level.

11.00 am - Jive Swing for Adults. Mark Webb, assisted by Lisa, started by saying he was going to show us a mix of moves for adult social dancers to stop them being scared off by the Jive! This was a brilliantly executed routine which I am sure people will find so useful for a social introduction to Jive or Swing. The routine could also be used as a Rock and Roll Medallist routine or even changed into a ballroom Jive style. There was a very enthusiastic response from the audience with many people joining Mark on the floor to learn the routine.

11.45 am - Ballroom Waltz and Quickstep with Marek Kosaty and Paulina Glozik. Marek took a very different approach to this lecture starting with an excellent demonstration of basic waltz figures; he continued to talk about creating the right connection through your own body and with your partner. He got people to join him on the floor to try some exercises for getting the lower part and the upper part of the body correctly centred. He talked about the idea of the man keeping his left side towards the lady 'closing the door' on the left side, and when taking a step creating a triangle shape with the legs on each step. He used the same ideas in the quickstep and pointed out that due to the speed of the music it is important to allow the legs to swing under the body.

This rounded off a vary varied and enjoyable morning of lectures with plenty of new ideas to take away and work on.

their dance ability'. 'I am absolutely thrilled to now have two students on the programme, and very excited for their future to follow their dream into the professional dance world'.



Greatest Showman

South West Area (Theatre)

Sunday 28th April 2019 at Broadclyst Victory Hall, Nr Exeter

What a fabulous day the South West Area (Theatre) had with their invited lecturers Steven Luke Walker and Elissa Clare Hicken; both of whom are industry professionals, and with "first-hand experience"; (Steven actually worked as the vocal coach on the film) lectured on "The Greatest Showman" – "Beyond the Curtain".

Indeed, both Steven, also known as "The Voice Whisperer" and Elissa, have impressive CV's with much experience working within the West End, on Broadway and on the Silver Screen: Steven, director of the "Vocal Sanctuary", wrote and produced his own musical (an historical fairy tale) Blaze; wrote and produced "Stars of the West End – Sing the Songs of Steven Luke Walker" at the Charing Cross Theatre; worked as the vocal coach on the film "The Greatest Showman" and also worked with Oscar winning actor Rami Malek on the film "Bohemian Rhapsody". Steven also worked as vocal coach on the stage musical "Bat out of Hell – The Musical" – and recently did the vocal overdubs on the film "Rocket Man" (the Elton John Movie) and is currently working on a new stage musical "Waitress".

Elissa is a performance coach and vocal coach (as well as being a dancer, choreographer and actress) who has worked across the West End; in TV and film. Elissa's stage credits include "The Lion the Witch and the Wardrobe" and the UK tour of "Fame". Elissa also enjoys choreographing for Motor Neurone Disease and the British Heart Foundation's charity campaigns.

The focus of the day's lectures was on vocal technique (singing whilst dancing/a dancer's breathing) and performance through integration of skills.

The morning session was for ages 7-10 years and the afternoon was for 11+ years, both were well attended, and it was lovely to see all the students thoroughly enjoying themselves on the floor. Both sessions took a similar format (the afternoon session was taken to a higher level suitable for the older students) and started with a very thorough and fun warm up taken by Elissa to music from The Greatest Showman.

After the fun warm up with Elissa; Steven took over - explaining that, first we warm the body up and then the voice. Steven then encouraged the students to stretch up, then give themselves a hug, breath in and out saying "I am the best"! This brought smiles to everyone's faces and I swear the students all grew taller by at least an inch!

The vocal coaching then began with Steven explaining the need for correct posture in order to "release" the voice, taking the students from; feet apart, loose knees, awareness of fingers, "butt" back then pull the tail in, to; long back and lifted head at which point he asked them to breath in for 4 counts and out for 8 counts making a "ssssshhh" sound. All the students were focussed and it was evident that this exercise was relaxing them beautifully, ready for their next instruction.

Steven and Elissa worked together as a team as the students were taken through more exercises. Steven made the point that if you tense the abdominals its harder for the voice to "get out" and together Steven and Elissa took them through the following: Find your bottom ribs (obliques) with your fingers; breath in and push the fingers away; release then make fist and do "Super Hero" pose; then with the breath "huv huv" up the scales! Other exercises included the "Lip Brill" making sure the air comes out the front of the mouth (not out the side like a horse!) and also the "Magic Raspberry" exercise which demonstrated the "recoil" breath – which worked like "magic" "hey

where did that breath come from"! All of the exercises were great fun and everyone was entertained by them (including the teachers watching who just couldn't resist having a go!).

Finally, to complete the integration of skills and move to the performance of the iconic song of the film "This Is Me" – Steven and Elissa spoke firstly about the emotion required to make the song believable, and here, Steven made the point that "when the emotion is so high we cannot speak anymore and we have to sing". He went on to explain that the song "This Is Me" is about rejection and hope, and encouraged the students to show both of these emotions with their bodies as well as their voices in order to give a convincing performance. Also, from a performance point of view, Steven and Elissa explained the different "levels of head" required to perform and project to all the levels of audience to whom a cast would be performing in a big theatre ie stalls, circle, balcony etc.

After learning the number, the students had the opportunity to perform this several times to the audience of teachers and returning parents, everyone "loved" it, and we were all truly entertained.

The South West Area (Theatre) are extremely grateful to Steven and Elissa for the fabulous and fun day of lectures they gave to all those present, together with all the helpful "hints and tips" they gave to the teachers and students on the floor. And we look forward to perhaps seeing them again, in the not too distant future, for a "Rocket Man" day! "Awesome"!

Mamma Mia

"Mamma Mia... here we go again!"

Or should I say "Success... here IDTA goes again!" and these stories are what inspire pupils and teachers alike.

Let's do this as a team, as that's exactly how this success story has happened. Beth Gourlay, originally from Redditch in Worcester, started her performing training with IDTA theatre Examiner Sue Latham at the Latham School of Dance in Redditch. Sue was imperative in Beth's training, as she laid the foundations, gave her the love, and inspired her to train and take IDTA examinations as an all round dancer. When I spoke to Sue at the recent IDTA event, she was delighted with Beth's recent exciting news. Theatre Examiner Carl Walker, who assisted Sue at the time, helped Beth with private lessons in Modern Jazz and IDTA competition work. Sue then requested that Beth start to work on her singing, that's where I came in.

Beth always had a talent, but she really respected further technical training, and focusing on the variety of styles which are in the Theatre Craft and Musical Theatre syllabus. She saw this as inspiration for a possible future career as a professional performer. When this was her serious intention, we decided to train her up for college auditions. She was really interested in going to Phil Winston's Theatreworks College, as she knew its reputation for training glamorous professionals, and respected that both Carl and I had worked there. She soon collated all her songs and an audition dance together. More importantly, her 6 inch Kurt Geiger heels, which we knew, with his eye for detail, that Mr Winston would be impressed with in her interview!

Following the audition, singing and dancing all day, and Mr Winston quite rightly complimenting the shoes(!), Beth was offered a place at the college. Whilst enjoying college training, and the challenge of working with the other great students, her life had a terrible blip. After a short term of illness, her long term boyfriend lost his battle with Cancer. Beth needed time, her family and the college were extremely supportive while she had a break from her performing work. She left college and amongst other jobs worked in a Nursing Home for a while, and knowing Beth, she probably still wore those Kurt Geiger heels with her nursing outfit! A while later her passion for performing forced her to pick herself up, and she went off and performed in a variety of jobs, including Thomas Land at Drayton Manor theme park, performing in a hotel in Cyprus, corporate work, and as singer dancer for P&O cruises. It was then that Beth came back to visit Carl Walker and said, 'I want to try out for musical theatre'. 'Ok...' I said, 'it's a big shift from what you've been doing, but anything is possible. You need to re-live all your college training, change your singing style, divert your singing repertoire, change the way you perform your songs, learn script work and think about varied monologues for auditions, go to see some musicals, neaten up your dance style, learn to adapt your image constantly, make some videos, and get an agent! Otherwise, it'll be easy!' With no time to lose we started training in singing, monologues, and reshaping Beth's style for her to be taken seriously in the musical theatre industry. After several attempts at various videos to send to agents, Beth was offered a place with Ride Personal Management. Her first audition was for Royal Caribbeans Musical Mamma Mia. Mamma Mia has followed several West End musicals, all which have successfully sailed the Oceans delighting audiences on holiday. Cats, We Will Rock You, Chicago, and Grease. One of Beth's friends from our school was appearing in Grease at the time, and she was determined to follow suit. 'If he can do it, so can I', she said with a determined glint in her eye, and donning another high heel. Her agent said, 'go to the Mamma Mia audition for experience, you probably won't do very well this time, as it's your first audition'. After a full day, singing the songs from the show, doing script work with others, and an intense dance call, oh, and up against '600' auditionees, Beth found herself in the final two. She was delighted, and

extremely shocked. However, just to drop a bombshell, she was then told that the casting directors were going to New York to repeat the same thing the next week! Oh..... Back to the drawing board, back in the studio, vocal warm-ups, a few adult dance classes, and I even suggested that she start to teach our children's classes, to see if we could inspire her in the teaching profession as a backup plan.
