Aims and Objectives

The aim of the IDTA Graded and Vocational Graded qualifications is to provide candidates with the opportunity to obtain recognised qualifications in Dance.

The qualifications also aim to encourage personal self-confidence and group awareness, and develop a general appreciation of Dance and provide an assessment of the candidate's progress and development.

The objectives of the Graded and Vocational Graded Examinations are to:

- gain understanding of rhythm and its development
- gain appreciation of varying musical styles and their interpretation
- develop the range of movement within the students' natural capabilities
- build a sound technique
- promote the understanding and use of dance terminology
- gain a clear understanding of body mechanics
- develop an awareness of the use of space
- develop an awareness of audience and sense of performance
- encourage the development of self-expression
- promote self-confidence in performance

IDTA's Graded and Vocational Graded qualifications motivate and encourage candidates of all ages and levels through a system of progressive mastery and to provide a form of training that develops and enhances skills, knowledge and understanding in a safe and consistent way. The qualifications are not only beneficial to those studying Dance as a recreational pursuit but could also prepare learners for further learning by helping them to develop their skills enabling them to progress to the next level.

These qualifications are suitable for learners in the pre-16, 16+, 16-18, 19+ age groups.

Progression

The Graded and Vocational Graded qualifications provide a progression route into the study of further dance qualifications and training. It can be argued that Graded and Vocational Graded qualifications by themselves are not strictly speaking 'vocational' in that they are not absolutely essential for entry into Dance. However, they remain a positive means of determining progress and enable students to learn the necessary techniques to gain entry to FE and HE courses. Graded and Vocational Graded qualifications operate according to a well-established methodology of 'progressive mastery'. They allow candidates to be tested in discrete stages in the development of a wide range of skills. They tend to be more rigorous than other types of exams and for that reason industry is confident that achievement at the highest level gained by candidates of Vocational Graded qualifications will have the skills necessary to perform or work in other areas of the business.

Qualification Structure

A Graded or Vocational Graded qualification consists of pre-prepared elements, all of which are performance based and which are specified in the relevant syllabus for each genre. The learning outcomes and assessment criteria for each grade can be found in Appendix 1. Section B: Assessment Information

Assessment Methodology

All assessment of these qualifications is external and is undertaken by IDTA Examiners. The IDTA offers two modes of assessment, both of which are carried out by IDTA Examiners:

Face to face examinations – these will be carried out at a suitable venue (e.g. dance school, community centre, church hall) organised by the dance teacher. An IDTA Examiner will be allocated to carry out the examination session in agreement with the teacher.

Live streamed examinations – where face to face examination session cannot be arranged, IDTA can off the opportunity for an examination session to be scheduled via live stream. Teachers should be aware of the guidelines and requirements for live streamed examinations which can be found at www.idta.co.uk

Live streamed examinations will only be offered where it is not possible to organise a face to face examination.

Expectations of Knowledge, Skills and Understanding

The Graded Examination system is based on the principle of 'progressive mastery': each grade demonstrates learning, progression and skills in incremental steps. Successful learning is characterised by a mastery of the fundamentals of the skills demanded in each grade. Candidates will complete a range of dance sequences in their chosen genre (the complexity and variety of which are determined by the grade being attempted), which allow them to demonstrate technique, musicality and performance skills to a set benchmark. These technical and performance skills set a foundation for further technical and artistic development by the candidate.

Quality Assurance

All IDTA examinations are standardised according to the processes and procedures laid down by the IDTA.

Section C: Policies

Accessibility of IDTA qualifications

The qualifications will:

- be available to everyone who is capable of reaching the required standards
- be free from any barriers that restrict access and progression
- offer equal opportunities for all wishing to access the qualifications

There are no prerequisites for other qualifications to be completed, and no specified prior knowledge, skills or understanding required prior to taking an IDTA Graded or Vocational Graded qualification. All reasonable adjustment requests should be submitted in advance of an examination and accompanied by relevant medical evidence.

IDTA Examinations

The IDTA has developed a range of examinations suitable for all ages and levels of experience and achievement.

Individuals, who gain a dance teaching qualification with the IDTA and are accepted into membership of the Association, may enter their pupils for IDTA examinations at amateur, performer and professional levels.

Teaching qualifications are available in eight core subjects, divided into three branches. Firstly, the Ballroom Branch which includes: Ballroom, Latin and Classical Sequence, secondly, the Freestyle Branch and finally, the four core subjects of Ballet, Tap, Contemporary Modern Jazz and Theatre Craft are classified as Theatre Branch subjects.

The IDTA offers two regulated teaching qualifications:

- IDTA Level 3 Diploma for Dance Teaching Assistants
- IDTA Level 4 Diploma in Dance Teaching

Specifications and guidance for both qualifications are available on the IDTA website.

The IDTA also offers teaching examinations in the non-core subjects of Line Dancing, Cheerleading, Street Dance, Rock 'n' Roll, Salsa, Belly Dancing, Argentine Tango, Dance Exercise and Gymnastic Dance (note: restrictions apply).

In addition to the two regulated dance teaching qualification are three levels of membership to the organisation, which are offered as non-regulated examinations. These are at Associate, Licentiate and Fellowship level. Please note that Associate examinations are offered for candidates outside of the UK only. UK candidates would be expected to enter the regulated qualification at level 4.

Access to the examination service is available only to members and is restricted to the branch(es) in which they hold member status.

The Association offers a wide variety of tests and awards for amateur / social dancers including Rosettes, Stardance Awards, Pre-juvenile Groups Awards, Preparatory and Primary Grades; plus a wide range of medal tests in many genres, from One Dance through Bronze, Silver and Gold medals and advancing through the Bars, Stars and President's Awards to the International Supreme Award. For the medal tests and higher awards, the dances are choreographed by the teacher and build in length and complexity. The Association also offers Social Dance Awards, and Team Awards.

Examination Procedures
