Aims and Objectives

The aim of the Level 3 Certificate in Progressive Tap Dance is to provide candidates with the opportunity to obtain a recognised qualification that sits between Grade 5 and Intermediate in Tap Dance.

The purpose of the qualification is to provide candidates with further opportunities to develop technical knowledge and skills in tap dance performance. In particular this will be of benefit to candidates who:

- Wish to progress to Intermediate level but want further development before making the transition to this level.
- Wish to progress to further study of tap dance but who do not want to progress to Intermediate or professional performance.

The qualifications also aim to encourage personal self-confidence and group awareness, and develop a general appreciation of Dance and provide an assessment of the candidate's progress and development.

The objectives of this qualification are to:

- gain understanding of rhythm and its development
- gain appreciation of varying musical styles and their interpretation
- develop the range of movement within the students' natural capabilities
- build a sound technique
- promote the understanding and use of dance terminology
- gain a clear understanding of body mechanics
- develop an awareness of the use of space
- develop an awareness of audience and sense of performance
- encourage the development of self-expression
- promote self-confidence in performance

These qualifications are suitable for learners in the pre-16, 16+, 16-18, 19+ age groups.

Progression

This qualification provides two key progression routes:

- For candidates who wish to progress to Intermediate level but want further development before making the transition to this level.
- For candidates who wish to progress to further study of tap dance but who do not want to progress to Intermediate or professional performance.

Qualification Structure

Section B: Assessment Information

Assessment Methodology

All assessment is external and is undertaken by IDTA Examiners. The IDTA offers two modes of assessment, both of which are carried out by IDTA Examiners:

Face to face examinations – these will be carried out at a suitable venue (e.g. dance school, community centre, church hall) organised by the dance teacher. An IDTA Examiner will be allocated to carry out the examination session in agreement with the teacher.

Live streamed examinations – where face to face examination session cannot be arranged, IDTA can off the opportunity for an examination session to be scheduled via live stream. Teachers should be aware of the guidelines and requirements for live streamed examinations which can be found at Exam Procedure Guide[Members' Information] (idta.co.uk)

Live streamed examinations will only be offered where it is not possible to organise a face to face examination.

Expectations of Knowledge, Skills and Understanding

Candidates will complete a range of dance sequences in tap dance which allow them to demonstrate technique, musicality and performance skills to a set benchmark. These technical and performance skills set a foundation for further technical and artistic development by the candidate.

Achievement at **Level 3** reflects the ability to build upon a range of skills, knowledge and understanding in relation to an increasingly refined vocabulary of movement and artistic interpretation showing an increased confidence, assurance and sensitivity in application.

At this level, the candidate:

- Demonstrates a sound and established knowledge and understanding of the technique and music of a particular dance discipline/genre.
- Demonstrates an increased awareness of performance and an increased understanding of the relationship between performer and audience.
- Demonstrates a wide range of movements performed consistently and confidently with technical accuracy and control.
- Demonstrates an increased sensitivity to a range of musical content and style appropriate to the dance discipline/genre/genre.
- Demonstrates dynamics and fluidity of movement incorporating the use of space and a maturity and individuality in interpretation and expression.

Quality Assurance

All IDTA examinations are standardised according to the processes and procedures laid down by the IDTA.

Section C: Policies

Accessibility of IDTA qualifications

The qualifications will:

- be available to everyone who is capable of reaching the required standards
- be free from any barriers that restrict access and progression
- offer equal opportunities for all wishing to access the qualifications

There are no prerequisites for other qualifications to be completed, and no specified prior knowledge, skills or understanding required prior to taking an IDTA Graded or Vocational Graded qualification. It is expected, however, that for successful learning, the skills demanded in each grade are likely to be mastered before progressing to the next grade.

Candidates for IDTA examinations must be entered through an IDTA dance teacher. A list of IDTA teachers is available from the IDTA website at www.idta.co.uk or from IDTA Head Office. This is not a complete list of IDTA dance teacher members, only those who have stated they wish to appear on these mailing lists.

Candidates requiring an adjustment to the assessment of any qualification should refer to IDTA's policy for reasonable adjustments and special consideration which can be found at <u>Ofqual, CCEA</u>, <u>Qualifications Wales, RQF - International Dance Teachers' Association (idta.co.uk)</u>. All reasonable adjustment requests should be submitted in advance of an examination and accompanied by relevant medical evidence.

Please note that a reasonable adjustment can only be granted to the format or conduct of an examination and not to the marks awarded.

Candidates will be assessed by the IDTA's Examiners to a set standard based on the following attainment bands in their chosen dance genre.

Appendix 2: About the IDTA

- To offer a comprehensive range of professional qualifications in all dance genres.
- To provide and maintain syllabi and technique in all dance genres to train dance for the profession.

The IDTA is an awarding organisation recognised by Ofqual in England, Qualifications Wales in Wales and CCEA in Northern Ireland.

IDTA Examinations

The IDTA has developed a range of examinations suitable for all ages and levels of experience and achievement.

Individuals, who gain a dance teaching qualification with the IDTA and are accepted into membership of the Association, may enter their pupils for IDTA examinations at amateur, performer and professional levels.

Teaching qualifications are available in eight core subjects, divided into three branches. Firstly, the Ballroom Branch which includes: Ballroom, Latin and Classical Sequence, secondly, the Freestyle Branch and finally, the four core subjects of Ballet, Tap, Contemporary Modern Jazz and Theatre Craft are classified as Theatre Branch subjects.

The IDTA offers two regulated teaching qualifications:

- IDTA Level 3 Diploma for Dance Teaching Assistants
- IDTA Level 4 Diploma in Dance Teaching

Specifications and guidance for both qualifications are available on the IDTA website.

The IDTA also offers teaching examinations in the non-core subjects of Line Dancing, Cheerleading, Street Dance, Rock 'n' Roll, Salsa, Belly Dancing, Argentine Tango, Dance Exercise and Gymnastic Dance (note: restrictions apply).

In addition to the two regulated dance teaching qualification are three levels of membership to the organisation, which are offered as non-regulated examinations. These are at Associate, Licentiate and Fellowship level. Please note that Associate examinations are offered for candidates outside of the UK only. UK candidates would be expected to enter the regulated qualification at level 4.

Access to the examination service is available only to members and is restricted to the branch(es) in which they hold member status.

The Association offers a wide variety of tests and awards for amateur / social dancers including Rosettes, Stardance Awards, Pre-juvenile Groups Awards, Preparatory and Primary Grades; plus a wide range of medal tests in many genres, from One Dance through Bronze, Silver and Gold medals and advancing through the Bars, Stars and President's Awards to the International Supreme Award. For the medal tests and higher awards, the dances are choreographed by the teacher and build in length and complexity. The Association also offers Social Dance Awards, and Team Awards.

Appendix 3: IDTA Dance Examination Guide

Examination Procedures

- The teacher will ensure that the candidate is suitably dressed with appropriate footwear.
 Candidates may wear an identifying coloured ribbon, number or badge which is noted on the report form to assist the Examiner.
- 2. Prior to the examination the teacher will ensure that the examination report form is filled in correctly and will verify the details with the candidate and the Examiner.
- 3. A music operator will be responsible for the music, taking instructions from the Examiner.
- 4. Candidates will perform all units of the grade being taken. Percentage contributions for each unit are recorded on the report form. Final marking will be based upon the total of marks awarded. (Pass mark 65%).

Two or three candidates – 40 minutes
